Our in-classroom career exploration curriculum helped students to prepare for their JA Inspire experience by guiding them through a process of identifying their likes, dislikes, strengths, and weaknesses. Upon identifying these key elements, students were given a customized list of ideal jobs to explore during their experience.

I want you to imagine arriving to a huge convention center and walking into a space filled with companies demonstrating what it's truly like to be a nurse, an engineer, a financial planner, a farmer, and even a rocket scientist! No long presentations and more than just brochures and handouts. I'm talking rocket ships, cranes, Humvees, fire trucks, mock emergency rooms, animals, and even virtual reality stimulations! Students were equipped with a workbook to interview exhibitors about their careers, including, skill, salary, and education requirements. They were able to do a hands-on activity at each exhibit to see what it would really feel like to "do" the job. Can you imagine getting to work on a power line or fly a plane when you're in the 8th grade? Or learning a hospital needs attorneys, accountants, and marketing to operate? How about learning all professionals who work in construction are not just carpenters, and agriculture professionals include food scientists and veterinarians?

Seeing their eyes of wonder and hearing their comments of amazement is something myself, JA staff, and any person in attendance that day will never forget. As a community, we should all be proud of what we accomplished that day. It was the day a future educator, scientist, lawyer, accountant, banker, nurse, doctor, or contractor realized... "I can do anything and anything is possible." An event of this size requires the dedication, organization, and hard work of an entire community, but the lasting results and unforgettable impact make all of it worthwhile. The full program consists of three segments: Pre-experience in-classroom sessions presented by the classroom teacher, the hands-on JA Inspire experience, and an in-classroom post-experience debrief and

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The JA Inspire curriculum is based on 4 core session topics and supported by six curriculum videos.

The classroom teacher guides students through the curriculum to ensure students are prepared and equipped to explore career interests and ask questions about the skills required to obtain those careers.

CAREER PLANNING STARTS WITH YOU

- Students recognize career clusters that match their skills and interests.
- Students identify industries and jobs that offer opportunities.
- Students identify companies they want to learn more about at the JA Inspire experience.

MAKING THE MOST OF JA INSPIRE

- Students assess their soft skills and identify need for improvement.
- Students prepare questions they want to ask and practice asking them.
- Students create an elevator pitch.
- Students express their expectations of the upcoming event.

- Students participate in hands-on activities, often using actual equipment or tools used on a job.
- The experience is designed to transform students' abstract ideas about work into tangible ambitions and plans, and to build their soft skills.

- Students identify next steps, including exploration of high school coursework and other research.
- Students compose thank you notes to businesses of their choice.
